Waste

Overview

We commonly associate the word waste with trash but waste can have many meanings. Recyclables and compost can also be referred to as waste but this waste is turned into something new. There are numerous waste streams that people may not be familiar with. This lesson introduces two less commonly known waste streams; electronic waste and household hazardous waste. In Delaware, residents have easy access to programs where these materials can be recycled or disposed of properly instead of thrown in the trash.

Directions

- Part 1: Students learn about the different waste streams by matching the vocabulary term with the correct definition.
- Part 2: Students will read the short story, *Katie's Quest: What Waste is Waste* and highlight any item that is waste. Students will then use the provided worksheet to record each waste item in its appropriate category. Then they will find one thing in the classroom that could also go into each category.


